nologists graduating from the country's educational systems.

The program offers a hands-on, project-based approach to learning that better prepares students for the rigors of college.



The program incorporates math, science, English, and technology skills needed for success. Taking PLTW

courses can help students decide whether an engineeringrelated career is or is not right for them.

At this time, the *Pathway To Engineering* strand of *Project Lead the Way* at White Plains High School will become certified by the 2015-2016 school.

By then (2015), students who will take the credit eligible Foundation Courses Students and meet RIT's minimum requirement for the end-of-year exam may register for and receive RIT undergraduate credit.

RIT requires these students to receive at least an 85 percent average in the course and score 70 or above on the college credit exam (70-79=C, 80-89=B, 90 and above is an A). The decision to apply for college credit is made after the exam has been taken and scored. The RIT college credit grade is based solely on the stanine earned on the final exam and not on the course grade. Therefore, the grade a student receives in the high school course may differ from the college credit grade. It is important for you to ask the teacher what the stanine grade is so that you can make an informed decision. If a student subsequently attends RIT, the college credit grade would be counted towards his/her overall grade point average. If a student attends another university, the course credits often are transferred without the letter grade. The total tuition charge for each course is \$200. RIT is converting to the semester system and each course will be worth three semester credit.



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SUPA—Syracuse University Project Advance (for Seniors)

English Reading & Writing Course 1 credit + (earn up to 6 college credits)

Students enrolled in SUPA, an Honors level course, may earn six college credits. The credits earned through Syracuse University are transferable to many (though not all) colleges and universities.





Students who qualify for this course will be required to register as a part time student at Syracuse University and will pay tuition to Syracuse University. Students pay a *reduced* tuition rate of \$110 per credit, a cost significantly lower than the part-time tuition rate of \$703 per credit. Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students should make a formal request directly to Syracuse University in order to receive a college transcript.

This course is available to students who earn a grade of "B" or higher in English 3R. Students who wish to apply must inform their guidance counselor of their interest, complete the honors application form, and then attend a formal meeting to be held in the spring.

During the spring, students will enroll in Reading and Interpretation, a freshman college level literature course.

ACE - Advanced College Experience (Juniors & Seniors) 1 credit (3 college credits from WCC)



The Advanced College Experience Program is an academic partnership between Westchester Community College and area high schools, which enables high school students to enroll in college level classes and earn college credit during their final year(s) of high school.

Classes are taught by approved, gualified high school teachers. Students must meet all college pre-requisites and follow the Westchester Community College syllabi. All classes take place in the high school during the students' regular school day.

Students pay a *reduced* tuition rate of \$59.67 per credit, a cost significantly lower than the part-time tuition rate of \$179 per credit. Students who complete all required coursework receive a grade which is recorded on an official Westchester Community College transcript, which can then be forwarded to the student's college for transfer credit evaluation.



Upon completion of a minimum of 60 hours of volunteer

activity you will receive a Certificate of Recognition and credit on your transcript for Community Service. This credit is in addition to the 22 credits required for a White



If a student has served a minimum of 60 hours, but less than 120 hours, the student will be awarded one-half (.5) Community Service Credit for that year. Any hours beyond that 60 will be carried forward to the next school year. One-half (.5) Community Service Credit will appear on the student's transcript for that year. If a student has served a minimum of 120 hours, the student will be awarded one (1) Community Service Credit for that year. Any hours beyond 120 will be carried forward to the next school year. One (1) Community Service Credit will appear on the student's transcript for that year.

No student can earn more than one (1) Community Service credit per school year, for a maximum of 4 such credits over the course of grades 9-12. This credit is elective, nonacademic credit that cannot be used toward graduation.

Documentation of hours served must be submitted by May 1 of each year. Hours earned following the May 1 deadline will be credited towards the following year's record.

BOARD ANNOUNCES SCHOOL BUDGET PLANNING PROCESS

The White Plains Board of Education has announced the district's 2014-15 budget planning process, continuing the successful community-wide forums held last year. Board President Rosemarie Eller said, "Next year's budget will be a tremendous challenge, responding to the state-imposed property tax levy cap, which is estimated at an approximate 1.5% increase. With proposed reductions in Federal aid, plus large increases in health insurance rates and pension costs - totally outside of district control, the district will need to consider about \$1 million in budget reductions to remain within the cap.". The district is seeking broad input on the budget from the com*munity, at two Budget Forums:*

Wednesday, March **19**th. Both are in the B-1 Room at WhitePlains High School, at 7:30 P.M.

Additional meetings will take place in the community and any group or organization wishing to host such a meeting may contact the Superintendent's Office at 422-2033. Discussions have also been held with staff to solicit their input.

All residents are invited to attend these sessions, to participate in focused dialogue on spending efficiencies, areas of concern, budget priorities and creative ways to increase revenues. A review of the district's financial situation, the state's and city's financial constraints, and other issues relating to development of the budget will be presented. The district will also hold two Public Hearings: the first on **March 10th**, on the Preliminary Proposed Budget, and the second on **May 12th**, on the Board of Education's Adopted Proposed Budget. Both hearings will take place at Education House, 5 Homeside Lane, at 7:30 P.M.

Superintendent of Schools Timothy P. Connors said, "We hope to work together with the community to develop a budget that maintains the high quality of education in White Plains and that is fiscally responsible and can be supported by the taxpayers in the **May 20th vote.**"

This program is designed for 9th, 10th and 11th grade students and parents/guardians. This evening is all about college entrance exams: the SAT, the ACT, the SAT IIs (subject tests). What are they? When should you take them? How many times/how many tests should you take? How are these used by colleges in their admissions process? These are the questions that we will answer over the course of this evening. Some students begin taking SAT Subject Tests as early as their sophomore year, so we encourage all freshmen, sophomore and junior parents and students to take advantage of this presentation.

"Non-College Options: Technical and Trade Schools, the Military and Gap Year Programs Thursday, April 24, 7:00 p.m.

This program is designed for junior and senior students and their parents/guardians. Some students need post-secondary alternatives to a direct progression to a two or four-year college or university program. A variety of presenters will be on hand to talk to you about technical and trade schools, all branches of the Military and gap year programs. Every student who graduates from high school should leave with a plan of action, and as many options as possible should be considered in that plan. Many options other than college can lead to a satisfying and rewarding career. Any one of the options that will be presented this evening may lead a student back to college at a later date, or perhaps not. Nonetheless, any one of them can lead a This program will introduce juniors and their parents/guardians to the college exploration and application process using Naviance. All aspects of the program will be demonstrated, and a timeline will be provided to ensure that you are on track for submitting your applications in your senior year. This is an important evening for all juniors, but it is essential for students who intend to apply Early Decision or Early Action in the fall.

"Student Athletes: What You Need to Know About the NCAA" Wed. , June 4, 7:30 p.m.

This program is designed for ALL student athletes and their parents/guardians. Each year very talented athletes who have devoted countless hours to physical training and practice are disappointed when they realize that they are not eligible to be recruited by Division I or II schools because they have not met the academic requirements of the National Clearing-house. If a student first discovers an academic shortcoming as a junior it can prove to be a difficult obstacle for the student to overcome in the time remaining in high school. If a student doesn't discover this until senior year, the obstacle may be insurmountable. Serious athletes must also be serious students from freshman year forward if they want to realize their dreams of participating at the highest level of college athletics. Please join us for this presentation by members of our counseling and coaching staff who will explain what you need to achieve academically in order to be NCAA eligible to compete in your chosen sport in college.

2 Class of 2014 Seniors Win Acorda Scientific Excellence Award!

White Plains High School Senior Max Golden won the Acorda Scientific Excellence Award. Max is in the third and final year of the Science Re-



search Program led by Mrs. Kimberly Fleming. The Acorda Scientific Excellence Award is presented in recognition of Westchester and Putnam County high school students who are engaged in highly significant scientific, technological, engineering and mathematical (STEM) research. Max's study entitled "The Effects of Temperature and Pressure on the Growth of

Graphene by Chemical Vapor Deposition of Ethylene on CuNi(111)" demonstrated a novel approach to growing graphene as a potential for large scale production. Max was interviewed by Lisa Wexler at WFAS, and the interview was broadcast Sunday morning 1/26, at 9am on AM1230. The interview is also be available at lisawexler.com. Max's mentor, Dr. Carl Ventrice Jr., submitted Max's research for publication to the Journal of Vacuum Sciences and Technology A, under the title "Growth and Characterization of Graphene on CuNi(111)". Max is the second author credited, and hopes it will be published within the next few months.

In addition, another White Plains High School Science Research senior, Diana Medina, has had her research submitted for publication. Diana is the first author credited in a study entitled "Adverse Effects of Daylight Savings Time on Adolescents' Sleep and Performance". Diana's study used the White Plains High School population to show that adolescent's sleep patterns and reaction times are significantly reduced the week following DST.



Juniors: College Planning Timeline for Spring & Summer '14

BY NOW your child should have picked up his/her PSAT results from guidance and logged into *MyCollegeQuickstart* to prepare to take the SAT in the spring. The access code for this is on your child's PSAT score report, and it is a tremendous resource that is available not only for test prep but also for college and career exploration. Your child should also be on *Naviance* exploring colleges using the "*SuperMatch*" to develop a list of schools that are of interest, and to learn about their admission requirements, application deadlines, etc.

RIGHT NOW your child should register for the *SAT* in May as well as one or two SAT Subject tests (required by many selective and highly selective colleges and universities) for June. We are a very popular regional testing center, so don't delay or you are likely to be closed out of our location. More information about these tests is linked to the HS Guidance Website. It would be a good idea to take the *ACT* with Writing in the spring as well.

BEFORE THE END OF THIS SCHOOL YEAR your child should decide which two teachers he/she would like to ask for college recommendations, and ask them before the end of the school year. This is especially critical if your child is planning to apply **Early Action** or **Early Decision** to schools in the fall. *EA and ED application deadlines can be as early as October 15th*, so waiting until September to ask a teacher for a recommendation is not a good idea!

DURING THE SUMMER con-

sider visiting a college or two, or three. They won't be in session so you will likely want to go back in the fall to check out a favorite when classes are going on and students are there to talk to. But you can certainly get a sense of the type of campus/ campus setting that appeals to your child.

YOUR CHILD SHOULD ALSO USE THE SUMMER TO WRITE HIS/

HER COLLEGE ESSAY! Waiting until the fall will result in a rushed job if your child is applying early. The student essay is one of the most important parts of the application. It needs to be thoughtful and well done in every respect. In September, all that should be left to do is to check with your counselor and an English teacher for tone, clarity, and accuracy with regard to grammar and spelling.

BY THE FALL, if your child arrives at school with a list of colleges that he/she will likely wish to apply to, scores from SAT, SAT Subject Tests and the ACT, two teacher letters of recommendation, and an almost-final-draft of a college essay, he/she will be well prepared to get applications out on time and with considerably less stress than students who wait until the last minute.

DON'T FORGET ABOUT YOUR CHILD'S GUIDANCE COUN-

SELOR! College planning begins in earnest in the spring of junior year, so your child should be sure to schedule a meeting with his/her counselor to discuss all of these things as soon as program planning ends in April. Your counselor is your most valuable resource in this process!!






